
IN MAY 2019, the National Trust for Historic Preservation and project partners worked with the Charlotte, North Carolina based firm Facilitate Movement to carry out a community centered visioning session. This 1.5 day-long session brought more than thirty partners and stakeholders together in Tryon, North Carolina to share ideas and suggestions for strategies to reactivate the Nina Simone Childhood Home. Participating stakeholders included individual artists and community members, Tryon residents, local organizations, and potential state, regional, national and global partners.

One of the recommendations emerging from this visioning session was the need to "hear and listen to the voices of more people in the community—especially African Americans—about their vision for the space." Given the residential nature of the neighborhood around the Nina Simone Childhood Home, the report emphasized the importance of talking with the neighbors within the vicinity of the house to hear their questions, comments and concerns and to develop a way to keep them updated as plans for the house move forward. Additionally, given the interest in an artist-in-residency program, the report from the community centered visioning session recommended reaching out to artists who might be willing to advise or pilot a fledgling residency program.

With support from the <u>Community Foundation of Western</u>
<u>North Carolina</u>, the National Trust embarked on a community engagement campaign to address these recommendations.




ENGAGING THE PUBLIC: What We Heard from the Community




In February 2020, a community engagement meeting was hosted by the National Trust and held at the Roseland Center in Tryon's eastside neighborhood. Participant data, from over 75 members of the community, was captured. Building on an earlier electronic survey that had explored interest in four potential uses including (1) a museum/interpreted space, (2) residential use, (3) an event space or (4) an artist retreat and learning facility, this meeting offered an opportunity to meet directly with members of the local community to learn more about how neighbors and other community members felt about potential uses that were being explored for the house and to identify any concerns that should be addressed up front.

ENGAGING THE PUBLIC: Virtual Outreach


In response to the COVID pandemic, virtual outreach and engagement sessions began in November 2020.

The purpose of these sessions was to build on the survey findings, and to gather more information about different perspectives on ways to reactivate the Nina Simone Childhood Home. This information is demonstrated in the web diagram to include the ranked comments from the February 2020 session as well as new or related commentary pulled from the virtual interviews. These new comments represent a condensed synthesis of similar thoughts and ideas shared throughout all engagement sessions.










GENERAL CONCEPT: Overview

Nina Simone's Childhood Home will be the "crown jewel" that is one part of a variety of Nina Simone offerings for the local community, travelers and visiting artists in the greater Tryon area. The house would serve as an extension of the Nina Simone visitor experiences available in downtown Tryon, with a regular schedule of small group tours offered at the house throughout the year to meet the demand. Furnishings and exhibits in the house will be kept to a bare minimum to accommodate a variety of different uses throughout the year.

Interpretive signage outside the house will identify the house and begin to tell the story, and an audio tour will be available so visitors who come to the house at times when it is not open to the public can hear Nina Simone's story and her music.

Artist-in-residency programs hosted at the house will specifically target Black or diverse women artists, and uplift talent that can be inspired by the opportunity to create in this space. To promote community engagement, participating artists will provide a concert, lecture, workshop or donate a completed work of art as part of their residency.

In addition to the vision above, there are several options around how the Nina Simone Childhood Home could be rehabilitated, including the development of additional support facilities.





NINA SIMONE CHILDHOOD HOME COMMUNITY SUPPORTED VISION: "Keep it Authentic"

Restoring the Nina Simone Childhood Home and keeping it without the addition of modern amenities provides an opportunity to preserve the beauty of the home space experienced by Nina and the Waymon family. Nina's early life and experience will be interpreted while also allowing the space to serve as a space for visitor and artists to meditate and gain inspiration to create in separate facilities with necessary amenities. For example, offsite facilities could be located across the street from the house. a short walk away in the neighborhood, or less than a mile away in downtown Tryon.

Preservation Treatment:

For this concept, the historic integrity of the house will be maintained by keeping it as close to its original appearance from when it was occupied by Nina Simone and the Waymon Family. The house



will have electricity, but no plumbing, running water, heat, or air conditioning. Original materials and details will be restored or replicated as identified in the exterior and interior rehabilitation plans.

Use and Programming: For this concept, the home will be used primarily as an interpreted historic site and a place of inspiration. The home would be available to artists, as a part of a residency program, to serve as a source for inspiration and artist studio space. However, as the lack of modern amenities is not conducive to all artists process, artists selected for this seasonal artist-in-residency program will be housed near the home and have access to additional spaces in Tryon.



NINA SIMONE CHILDHOOD HOME COMMUNITY SUPPORTED VISION: "Create a "And" instead of a "Either/Or"

Rehabilitation of the Nina Simone Childhood Home to accommodate modern amenities provides an opportunity for the home to serve as a community anchor that will ground both visitors and artists, while allowing the home and site to expand to be inclusive, accessible and meets the requirements of an artist residency. Visitors and guests at the Nina Simone Childhood Home will be comfortable and are able to fully utilize the house and site year-round.

Preservation Treatment: Option A

For this option the home's character defining features and historic materials will be maintained along with the addition of electricity, plumbing, running water, insulation, and HVAC. A modern addition would be constructed attached to the home (south façade) and contain a bathroom and kitchen.. The rehabilitation and new construction would be developed in consultation with Preservation North Carolina and the North Carolina Department of Natural and Cultural Resources.




Preservation Treatment: Option B

For this option, the home would be treated as outlined in Option A. However, a separate accessory building would be constructed adjacent to the home on the east side of the home's lot to contain bathroom and kitchen facilities, as well as studio space and small living quarters. The rehabilitation and new construction would be developed in consultation with Preservation North Carolina and the North Carolina Department of Natural and Cultural Resources.

Use and Programming: For this concept the home and site will accommodate multiple uses including interpretation, artists residency, individual and group tours, special events (i.e. workshops, music classes, performances) and private events. The uses would be developed and managed with the intent of partnership with existing organizations in Tryon and the larger region, while a master calendar would coordinate the variety of events.








Nina's childhood home in Tryon, North Carolina is designated a National Treasure by the National Trust for Historic Preservation.

APPENDIX: Nina Simone Historic Sites in Tryon



The Nina Simone Childhood Home is part of a larger network of sites within the town of Tryon in Western North Carolina. Other notable sites include the Nina Simone Plaza, the Lanier Library where Nina had one of her first performances, as well as the future site of the Nina Simone Archive.

APPENDIX: Nina Simone and Heritage Tourism in Western North Carolina





APPENDIX: Nina Simone and Heritage Tourism in North Carolina




